Benchmark Analysis

This document has been prepared by the University Libraries (Pius XII Memorial Library and the Medical Center Library). Through rigorous assessment, the University Libraries have identified competitor/peer and national/global aspirational institutions of higher education in the United States by which to benchmark, with the overall goal of moving Saint Louis University into the list of the top 50 colleges and universities in the U.S. as annually identified by *U.S. News & World Report*.

Specific areas within library and information resources, services, personnel, and facilities have been carefully selected to be used as benchmarks. Data points can be compared to identified institutions in order to determine relative relationship (e.g., better than, same, needs improvement in) to the University Libraries at SLU.

Additionally, due to the specificity of its collection and clientele, the Medical Center Library is compared to other AJCU institutions that have medical center libraries. These include: Georgetown University, Loyola Chicago, and Creighton.

In addition to NCES and IPEDS data and the U.S. News & World Report rankings for 2013, benchmarking and peer comparisons were guided by the following documents:

- Total enrollment
- Undergraduate enrollment
- Graduate student population
- Faculty and graduate research dollars
- ARL (Association of Research Libraries) status
- AJCU institutions
- Institutions with both a medical school and a law school

RESOURCES

- Internationally recognized Vatican Film Library and Medieval Manuscripts Collection.
- Premier philosophy, religion, and theology collections.
- Undergraduate use of Special Collections materials.
- □ Library Digitization Center partners with SLU Center for Digital Humanities, located in Pius Library.

SERVICES

- Comprehensive liaison program partners with faculty and students across academic programs to support, teaching, scholarship, and research.
- Continued implementation of emerging technologies (e.g. information access via handheld devices, laptop loan program, Digital Document Delivery).

FACILITIES

- Among highest in number of hours open per week.
- Library renovation in 2012 added a second service desk, doubled seating capacity, increased group study space, significantly enhanced connectivity, and reconfigured spaces.

PERSONNEL

All faculty librarians hold a master's degree in library and information science from an institution accredited by the American Library Association.

AREAS OF OPPORTUNITY RESOURCES

 Additional funding for materials will expand competitive advantage and strengthen support for new programs.

SERVICES

- Strengthening the integration of information literacy in academic programs to ensure SLU graduates students ready for the knowledge economy.
- Libraries continue to expand proactive early warning and intervention strategies for students with academic difficulties in order to strengthen retention and enhance student success in their disciplines, working closely with undergraduate & graduate writing centers, tutoring services, the EAP Resource Center, Office of Enrollment and Retention, department based retention efforts, and the CTTL.

FACILITIES

 Despite increase due to renovation, additional group study space is still in demand. Special Collections spaces were not included in the 2012 renovation.

PERSONNEL

 Additional professional development support will better leverage expert knowledge base of professional staff.

AREAS OF DISTINCTION

RESOURCES

Nationally recognized digital document delivery program rapidly provides all journal articles to users' computer desktop.

SERVICES

Comprehensive liaison program partners with faculty and students in all Medical Center programs to support teaching, research, scholarship, and clinical care.

The Library now offers an online elective for fourth year medical students called "Evidence-Based Medicine (EBM) Information Skills for Residency."

This popular web-based course provides graduating students with effective EBM techniques for searching the bio-medical literature for the highest level evidence-based information for patient care.

- Representative comments from recent student evaluators include:
 - "This course provided a foundation for skills that I can access throughout residency."
 - "This course exceeded my expectations in a positive manner. My EBM search skills significantly improved as a result of taking this course."

FACILITIES

- 109 regular service hours per week highest among Jesuit peers.
- Library facility being developed as wellappointed, comfortable setting for quiet study and research.

PERSONNEL

All medical reference librarians hold advanced subject credentials matched to the programs they serve, including MD, PhD, and RN degrees.

AREAS OF OPPORTUNITY RESOURCES

 Additional funding for materials will expand competitive advantage and strengthen support for new programs.

A dedicated endowment for biomedical information resources will supplement regular annual allocations for materials.

SERVICES

Further engagement with clinical medicine users – particularly medical residents – will extend service effectiveness and impact.

FACILITIES

- Planned updates will improve functionality, efficiency, and appearance of physical library.
- Working with Medical Center Development to seek funding support will ease burden on capital budget.

PERSONNEL

 Additional professional development support will better leverage expert knowledge base of professional staff.
